

## **Craven Primary Summer 2 2016 Sport Premium Report**

With this being the term in which the annual School Games event takes place, the teaching and learning has focused largely on athletics and a range of multi skills across all age ranges.

Members of staff have worked with the PE Mentor to develop and deliver lessons which involved a range of multi-skilled games and activities to enable children to develop their running, throwing and jumping skills across all age ranges.

In KS1 activities included basic agility courses, running races and lots of opportunities for children to investigate their most efficient way of throwing and jumping, through independent games and group work. KS2 children extended this knowledge and began to use specific throwing and jumping techniques linked to athletics, in which they competed in small groups within the lesson.

Upper KS2 had the opportunity to work in groups to analyse their peers and look at individual strengths and how a person's physical attributes enable them to excel in specific disciplines. Following class competitions, the Y5 and Y6 class selected three individuals to represent their class in five different athletics events. The times and distances were totalled by the PE Mentor to give an overall score. These scores were then compared to several other cohorts from within Hull Schools.

Craven Y6 pupils did especially well and achieved the Silver medal, missing out on gold by just a few points.

Year one and Year 2 pupils have also worked with the PE Mentor to introduce basic fielding and catching games into their lessons as well as developing some ball control skills using the European Championships as a stimuli for a sequence of lessons. Following the support of the PE Mentor staff members now have a range of lessons which involve activities that can be easily adapted to suit the needs and abilities of all pupils.

This term has also hosted the School Games Day in which all pupils from KS1 and KS2 were able to compete in every single event and the vast majority of pupils did so. Many pupils chose to compete in events they knew were very challenging for their ability as a result of the support and encouragement of their peers. Observing this really highlights the strengths in pupil behaviour and cooperative learning ability of all the pupils at Craven Primary Academy.

All pupils competed with determination and perseverance, both for their team and to become the 'most winning athlete'. The pupils all modelled an excellent understanding of the Olympic values, making it a very successful day which all pupils thoroughly enjoyed.

This term there has also been a very successful fundraising event through Sport for Schools. Craven Primary now has active links with many local clubs and is always looking for further opportunities to engage all pupils in extra-curricular and curricular time PE. The event had all pupils in KS1 and KS2 taking part in a challenging circuit of activities, under the watchful eye of Olympic athlete; James Denny. The event raised lots of money for further sport equipment and also gave the pupils a clear opportunity to be inspired by a successful athlete, encouraging them further to aim high and raise aspirations.

The school has also been awarded the Gold Kite mark award for their dedication to sport and pupil engagement in school sport and competition. This is an Ofsted recognised award and a 'tool' for which they use to judge the effectiveness of the use of School Sport Premium Money they currently receive. This is a fantastic achievement for all involved.
